



THE BLESSING OF THE SABBATH

“God created the world and then declared Sabbath time, time set apart for rest. God rested; so we rest and celebrate the grandeur and mystery of creation. If you can, go outside and look around. Take the created world in through all your senses and remember you are a part of it. You belong to God your Creator. Read Psalm 8.”



These instructions were given to the Disciple Bible Study classes that are meeting on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Genesis and Exodus are the books we are studying this fall, and Sabbath is a central part in the creation of the world, in the redemption of the people of God, in God’s provision for the people, and in how the people of God extend kindness and compassion to others. Recognizing the importance of Sabbath, the weekly Bible study asks each participant to set aside time to practice Sabbath remembrance and observance. Far from being a heavy burden, these Sabbath remembrances and observances invite us to celebrate God’s goodness and grace.

Although the assignment comes in the context of the weekly Bible study, remembering and observing the Sabbath is something we can all practice and experience. I wonder if we all might answer the call to embark on the amazing adventure offered regarding the Sabbath. There is really no limit to the ways we can celebrate the grandeur and mystery of creation. The assignment encourages us to take the created world in through all of our senses. How our hearts might be stirred with wonder and appreciation for God as we . . .

- Lick our lips and savor the salty taste on our tongue that comes as the ocean mist sprays and surrounds us.
- Crane our necks to see the stars shining in all their glory on a cool and crisp fall evening.
- Take a slow and gentle drive through our native New England to see the autumn colors burst forth, reminding us that to everything there is a season, and a time for everything under the sun.
- Settle into the sand, digging your toes in as you gaze from the shore at the breaking waves and hear the roars of the water calling to mind the mighty power of God.
- Wander off on a trail, deep into the woods, until you are surrounded with the peaceful silence that allows your soul the space to be still and know the peace and the presence of God.

Maybe it has always been this way, but in this particular time we live in, it seems like there is always breaking news, there is always urgent news, there is always critical news, there is always important news. Be that as it may, Sabbath gives us time in our lives for a different type of news. When we keep Sabbath we allow God to fill our hearts and minds and souls with good news. The good news is that there is a creator, one whose word has brought life, whose purposes are good, and whose promises are sure and unchanging.

I leave you with the Sabbath command as found in Exodus 20, a command that is good and pleasing, one that replenishes even as it recreates, bringing rest and renewal. May we all be blessed by God's timeless command to be people of the Sabbath.

“Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God. On it you shall not do any work, neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your male or female servant, nor your animals nor any foreigner residing in your towns. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but He rested on the seventh day. Therefore, the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy.” —Exodus 20:8-11

During the transition of newly formed Family Housing Support of Southwest Rhode Island Inc. (501C#3), new volunteers are letting us know in what capacity they can help out with the upcoming fundraising events. Other people are letting us know that they can obtain certain services or items or donations that never before were coming forward.



The big difference between FHS now and before is that now we are going to have a clear idea of the progress of the tenants of the properties we will be managing, whereas before, we were dependent on the case managers of the apartments. Now if someone's car is not working or their daycare situation falls through, we have a community of solutions to apply to the case. Uniting new forms of communication and creating longer arms to reach this growing population is a big goal.

Reformation/The Kirkin' O' the Tartans Sunday

Reformation Sunday is October 28th. In the 1500's, after studying with John Calvin in Geneva, John Knox returned to Scotland and continued to urge the reforms that led to the creation of Presbyterianism. Local Presbyterian churches became known as kirks.


Tartans are an internationally recognized symbol of Scotland. Highlanders wore clothes with distinctive striped or checked patterns, and the growth of clan and family tartans became popular in the mid-18th Century. As part of the effort to bring Scottish Highlanders under control in the 1700's, the Act of Proscription was passed and the wearing of the tartan was banned. From that period came the legend of Highlanders secretly bringing pieces of tartan cloth into their kirks to be blessed. In the mid-1900's, Presbyterian Minister Reverend Peter Marshall gave a sermon at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church entitled "Kirkin' o' the Tartans" and the celebration was born out of subsequent services.

The people of God have celebrated their faith and heritage across time. Today churches of many denominations celebrate the Kirkin' O' the Tartan service. Our Church has deep roots in the community and those roots reach wide across cultures and traditions. **On Sunday, October 28th we are invited to bring to Worship items that are important to the spiritual life of our families.** Certainly, those of **Scottish heritage** are encouraged to bring **a piece of their family tartan.** We are all invited to bring an item: **a Bible, a prayer shawl, anything that is important to our worship life.** These symbols of who we are and how we worship will be placed at the front of the church and as we worship will remind us of the great diversity among us and the unity and oneness our faith in Jesus Christ brings.


Domestic violence affects people of all ages. Domestic violence affects mostly women, but men as well. There are also certain populations that are more at risk.

SEW GOOD SOULS UPDATE—October 2018

Our sewing mission is off to a good start. So far we have engaged participants from our church family, as well as people from our local community, and friends from Barrington and nearby Connecticut.

In addition to continuing *Dress A Girl Around the World* (DAG) and *Quilts Beyond Borders* (QBB) in first and second quarters of 2019, ***we have a goal for two of our projects to become all-year round, on-going projects that can be done at home, involving more members of our church.***

The first at home project is the SKQ project. We frequently receive requests from animal shelters in and outside of the United States for small kennel quilts—a 12 x 18” mat that would go in a pet crate—no bigger than a placemat. They are basically a top and back fabric with batting in the middle and a few straight stitches on the top to secure the fabrics.

The second at home project is making Quilt Kits that Karen Matheson, the Northeast QBB Coordinator, brings to the Houston International Quilt Festival each year. We gave Karen 50+ kits for 2018 and we want to get a jump start on the 2019 kits. Kits are made up of fabric squares cut with a rotary cutter and placed in plastic bags.

For these at home projects, you can use 100% cotton fabric you have at home or we can give you fabric that has been donated for our mission. You can sew at home alone, or invite some friends over to work with you. The more hands working together will make our international sewing mission even more successful, and there is a lot of satisfaction that comes with this.

We will be in Fellowship Hall Sunday, October 7 to show you samples, answer questions and give out handouts if you are interested. We will also have fabric for you to take home if you want to get started on either of these projects.


