Children  
of God

There is a little chorus of praise that is a favorite of mine.

*Behold what manner of love the Father has given unto us  
Behold what manner of love the Father has given unto us  
That we should be called the children of God  
That we should be called the children of God.*

The song comes from I John 3:1. We would often sing it in a round, with one group starting and then a second joining in. To have the words of God's love echoing back and forth is a very special blessing. We need to be reminded that as children of God we are deeply and dearly loved.

When we were in Jerusalem in 2011, one of our stops was The Church of The Pater Noster. Pater Noster in Latin means "Our Father". The church, which is Roman Catholic, has 60 panels. Each panel has the Lord's Prayer in a different language. There is even a panel in Braille.

We attended a worldwide mission conference when we were in college in 1981. 17,000 students were challenged to share the word of Christ around the world. We came home from that conference convinced God was calling us to pastoral work. Our friend, Dave, came home convinced God was calling him to help translate the Bible so that every person would be able to read the Bible in their own language. He became a translator with Wycliffe Bible Translators and served in Nepal for many years. Through Wycliffe and other organizations, the entire Bible has been translated into 670 languages. The New Testament has been translated into 1,521 languages.

Singing with 20 or 30 brothers and sisters in Christ about the great joy of God's love, the great joy of knowing we are called children of God is a precious experience of community. We were singing in a round. We were all singing in the same language. Can you imagine people from 60 different languages standing before the panels at the Church of the Pater Noster and each one reciting the Lord's Prayer in their own language? Can you imagine how powerful it would be to hear 60 different people together saying, "Our Father..." in 60 different languages? And what if we could gather 1,521 people together representing all the languages of the New Testament as it is currently translated singing, "Behold what manner of love the Father has given unto us, that we should be called the children of God." O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing...indeed.

In February there is great fanfare about love. Of course, I enjoy the cards and decorations and sweet treats surrounding Valentine's Day, but in a much more profound way, I find myself bowing in reverent awe at the mystery of our God, who is so great that all of the children of the world can call this one God "Our Father." We can be from every continent and every country and yet have this in common. We are all children of God. In God's great love we all belong as God's precious children.

We hosted a Korean congregation at our church in Houston. We gathered together to discuss some conflict we were experiencing as we shared common space. We were struggling to understand each other, but when our meeting ended by singing together the hymn, "How Great Thou Art", each in our own language, the power of knowing what we had in common overcame the differences we were facing.

On a mission trip to Mexico a man befriended me. Through a translator he shared his experiences of faith, the hopes and fears he had. My Spanish is limited. And yet after our long conversation, when he looked at me with a warm smile, extended his hand toward mine, and said a few words, even with my limited Spanish, I understood. This dear man said, "Hermanos en Cristo". He said we were brothers in Christ.

One day every knee will bow. One day every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord. On that day we will all realize Jesus is the King of kings and the Lord of lords. On that day we will also realize that all of us as God's precious and beloved children are brothers and sisters. We are all part of one family, the family where God is our Father.



## Supplies needed for the VBS Fun Shop on Saturday, March 16<sup>th</sup>

- Spray adhesive
- 2” foam blocks
- clear packing tape
- 12-14 furring strips
- 18” roll of brown paper
- 40 paint sticks
- 2 concrete form tubes (4 feet long, 10 inches wide)
- yellow plastic table cover roll
- orange plastic table cover roll
- 1-inch foam core sheets
- black paint
- paint roller
- paint roller pan
- 1” paintbrush
- paint (dark brown, tan, khaki, or yellow house paint)

## Session Update

## WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

The official definition: “Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian church through the governing bodies [mid councils] to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians” (GA Minutes, Part I, 1995).



In essence: Per capita is a set amount of money (apportionment) per member that congregations pay to the larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Said another way, it is a Presbyterian Covenant Community Fund — part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. Because every Presbyterian shares in the benefit of the PC(USA)’s system of government, the expenses associated with coordinating and performing the functions of that system should be shared by everyone as well.

## WHO PAYS PER CAPITA, AND HOW MUCH?

Congregations (through their sessions) pay an annual amount of money per church member — per capita apportionment — to their respective presbyteries.

The per capita amount requested from a congregation is a combined total of requests from that congregation’s presbytery, the synod in which the presbytery is located, and the General Assembly — based on their respective budgets for the coming year(s).

DCCCP will pay 2018 Per Capita of \$50.05 per member, as determined by our General Assembly, Synod, and Presbytery. All PC(USA) churches pay per capita to share the expenses of those governing councils. The church will pay \$100.10 for two members in your family/household, \$150.15 for three members, etc. Your contribution to cover your household’s portion of this assessment would be greatly appreciated. For checks, please note "Per Capita" on the memo line.

## WHY DOES THE PER CAPITA RATE DIFFER AMONG PRESBYTERIES?

Each presbytery begins with the General Assembly per capita rate and adds the amount needed to support its specific mission and administrative functions.

A presbytery’s per capita rate requested from its congregations depends on its geographical location and size, as well as its mission needs and the needs of the respective synod.

## HOW IS THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY PER CAPITA RATE SET?

The General Assembly per capita rate is set every two years at the biennial General Assembly meeting.

At each GA, a proposed budget for the coming two-year period is approved. The per capita rate is set by dividing the total GA-approved budget by the total PC(USA) church membership.

The rate is based on the membership of PC(USA) churches two years earlier, which are the most recent figures available when GA budgets are approved.

## WHAT IS THE CURRENT GENERAL ASSEMBLY PER CAPITA RATE?

The GA per capita rate for 2019 is \$8.95.

## WHAT DO GA PER CAPITA DOLLARS PROVIDE?

Presbyterians believe we discern best what God is calling us to do when we gather together, “seek[ing] ... to find and represent the will of Christ” (*Book of Order*, F-3.0204).

Per capita funding is how we mutually share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit’s leading for the future.

For example, the funding provides for the cost of bringing together:

- commissioners and advisory delegates to the General Assembly (as well as the cost of planning and holding the meeting)
- church leaders from presbyteries and synods for training events
- necessary tools to develop and administer ordination exams to seminarians preparing to become future pastors
- those who are elected by the GA to serve on permanent GA committees (as well as each committee’s work), such as the GA Nominating Committee and the GA Committee on Representation

Per capita also funds:

- the expenses of the Co-Moderators of the General Assembly as they travel across the church to attend church anniversaries, presbytery meetings, retreats, ecumenical gatherings, and so forth
- work in the area of ordered ministry, helping all Presbyterians discern their sense of God’s call in their lives
- information, advice, and counsel to presbyteries and pastors whose members have immigration issues
- the Presbyterian Historical Society, assuring that our witness to the gospel today will be preserved for future generations, just as we have learned about the history of past generations
- the production (in multiple languages) and distribution of the *Book of Order*, *The Book of Confessions*, and other GA publications
- a Presbyterian presence at ecumenical groups and gatherings in this country and worldwide, which extends our mission efforts and our work for peace and justice far beyond what we can do by ourselves and promotes Christian unity
- the staffing and administrative costs necessary to coordinate all of the above, including the office of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly

# Mission—Serving the Community

## The strategy of addressing homelessness in RI has changes and Family Housing maintains a flexible position.

As we educate ourselves about the homeless population in RI, we learn that there are at least two budgeting groups; “emergency” and “transitioning”. After a period of time in the homeless system, it seems that the family would then be budgeted as a transitioning family, while a family found in a car at night and needs immediate shelter would be considered an emergency housing condition family.

The coalition has determined that the long term solution is to find permanent housing solutions for the people and not just inject help. The State, however, has decided to focus the funding on the emergency housing needs. Does this leave the transitioning families short of resources? This implies a possible waiting period until a “transitioning” family can be considered as “emergency” to qualify for the funding of aid.

Where does it leave this family if they do not fall in the group that is being funded?

The statistics from RI Coalition for the Homeless on how many of this population rotates in and out of the system is 18% in 2015. With this new funding strategy, it seems that the homeless families of RI are being set up to be on a treadmill of assistance instead of having the “teaching a man to fish” philosophy. FHS maintains one apartment and while these families will eventually transfer, so will FHS in filling in the gaps of services so we are where we need to be to keep our children sheltered.

**Family Housing Support’s Mission Statement:** To establish a community partnership to address the needs of families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness in South West Rhode Island.

The founding Board of Family Housing Support of SW RI brings a diverse bond of contacts, skills and resources whose intent is to maintain this mission.

\$43,263 has been raised since April 2014. Thank you for your support.



The seasons of Advent and Christmas were a busy time in the music and worship life of the church.


- ◆ Our Community Church Ringers participated in a regional handbell concert, preparing five pieces in addition to their regular worship offerings.
