As we now have a Pastoral Nominating Committee in place, they will prepare a Church Information Form (CIF) to describe DCCCP is as a congregation and community. This will be available to potential pastoral candidates to learn what

we are all about. The survey we took will help to describe our congregation. Progress reports will be made in the Scribe as the PNC goes along.

Plans are underway for Vacation Bible School. Volunteers (adults and teens) are needed. So far 10 students have signed up, however, in the past many more kids show up on the first day! A list of items needed are listed in the bulletin or ask Amanda how you can help. Teen trip to Montreat is being planned, but a lot of details need to be worked out. As we make the way for a new pastor, a lot of organizational things need to be defined both in terms of volunteers, programs and staff responsibilities. Things are going along well, but we need to do a better job defining programs and how they operate. Session will begin discussion on this at its July meeting.

Eleven people were CPR certified at the class sponsored by the Compliance Committee. The Compliance Committee is now exploring the purchase of a security system. Exiting the church during the summer months is very dangerous to say the least! Folks are urged to only turn right leaving the parking lot. We explored hiring a police detail, which would be prohibitively expensive.


