#### Good news!

The PNC reports good progress being made. Presby-

tery is reviewing our Ministry Discernment Profile, and has made suggestions for improvement. When Presbytery's Commission on Ministry approves it, we are authorized to post the position. Rally Day was a success, and Tuesday night dinners will return on alternating weeks which will include a children's activity and a prayer service.

#### Bad news...

On a serious note, our pledge income and giving is down, much lower than the usual summer slump. Finances are running a deficit currently at \$27,000 which may project to \$65,000, by year's end. This becomes more serious as we consider potential salary, moving and living expenses for a new pastor in the new year.

CAMPAIGN This year's pledge goal is \$272,000, representing a 3% increase from last year. The primary reason for the increase is calling a new

pastor and potential expenses involved. While I have faith in the PNC and know that God's hand is guiding their search and this church, I don't have faith that living expenses in this area are going to decrease anytime soon. We, as a church, want to provide the best possible financial package in order to attract the best candidate. And yes, housing costs will figure greatly into this package. What this figure will be will depend on many factors: where they are moving from, if they have a family or a spouse, if that spouse can continue working in the same job.

We have a great staff, Andy and Grace do a wonderful job leading us in music every Sunday, Amanda works with the children of the church, Michael keeps the youth active and engaged, Nancy keeps the office running smoothly and Joan keeps everything together.

You, the congregation, also provide a great deal of support in terms of time and talent. The brochure lists all the hours that members put on various committees and activities for the church and the community. As we gathered the information, we, the stewardship commit-

tee, were impressed by how active our church is and how many hours church members contribute to the various missions of the church. And I am sure that the list is missing some activities, so it is a low estimate.

So, as you consider your 2024 pledge, please think about how much treasure you can pledge and what you can pledge/contribute in terms of time and talent.

# Reformation Sunday October 29h

### The Kirkin' O'the Tartans



In the 1500's, after studying with John Calvin in Geneva, John Knox returned to Scotland and continued to urge the reforms that led to the creation of Presbyterianism. Local Presbyterian churches became known as kirks.

Tartans are an internationally recognized symbol of Scotland. Highlanders wore clothes with distinctive striped or checked patterns, and the growth of clan and family tartans became popular in the mid-18<sup>th</sup> Century. As part of the effort to bring Scottish Highlanders under control in the 1700's, the Act of Proscription was passed and the wearing of the tartan was banned. From that period came the legend of Highlanders secretly bringing pieces of tartan cloth into their kirks to be blessed. In the mid-1900's, Presbyterian Minister Reverend Peter Marshall gave a sermon at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church entitled "Kirkin' o' the Tartans" and the celebration was born out of subsequent services.

The people of God have celebrated their faith and heritage across time. Today churches of many denominations celebrate the Kirkin' O' the Tartan service. Our Church has deep roots in the community and those roots reach wide across cultures and traditions. Our practice has been to bring items important to our spiritual life to church on Reformation Sunday.

On Sunday, October 29th we are invited to bring items important to our journey of faith; a bible, prayer shawl, etc. Certainly, those of Scottish heritage are encouraged to wear a piece of their family tartan to worship.

These symbols of who we are and how we worship will remind us of the great diversity among us and the unity and oneness that our faith in Jesus Christ brings.


